

Froma Lane Street Art Gallery




Froma Lane Street Art Gallery leads visitors to the steps of the Blue Mountains Cultural Centre from Katoomba Street via a vibrant corridor of art and colour. The laneway features work from seven local street artists, including Man.De, Jodee Knowles, Nastia Gladushchenko, Claire Nagazawa, Sama Cooper, Scott Nagy & Janne Birkner, and is inspired by themes of flight, movement and nature.

1. *Echo Lane*, Dr Andrew Belletty Blue Mountains Cultural Centre

Dr Andrew Belletty is an internationally acclaimed sound designer. His work *Echo Lane* creates a space for shared acoustic experiences, featuring six trumpet horn speakers suspended above to encompass unique acoustic properties, allowing sounds to echo naturally and organically.



2. Breathing Tree 2012, Ken & Julia Yonetani Blue Mountains Cultural Centre Accessible Entrance, College Lane Ken + Julia Yonetani explore the interaction between humans, nature, science and the hidden connections between people and their environment. Their work Breathing Tree is comprised of approximately 14,000 handmade



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11. *Cloak of Hope,* Kevina-Jo Smith Katoomba Town Centre Arcade, Civic Centre Wall

Kevina-Jo Smith creates work that prompts meaningful discussion about the need to protect our fragile and unique environment and to inspire true, systematic change for our future. *Cloak of Hope* is an abstract topographical covering, constructed by hand over a seven-month period, from up-cycled materials and solar lights.



12. *Luminous Presence*, Man.De Katoomba Town Centre Arcade, Downstairs

Man.De uses art to remind us that nature can have a very positive impact on our lives, reducing anxiety and stress and increasing our attention, creativity and ability to connect with other people. This public artwork celebrates the diversity and abundance of Australia's wild flowers.



13. *Yanema Waradah (Walk with Waratahs),* Leanne Tobin Katoomba Town Centre Arcade, Upstairs

Leanne Tobin is of Irish, English and Aboriginal ancestry, descending from the Buruberong and Wumali clans of the Dharug, the traditional Aboriginal people of the Greater Sydney region. Beautiful waratahs proliferate in this place and symbolise our Blue Mountains community, tall and resilient, survivors of the ravages of bushfires, droughts and other forces of Nature.



14. *The Gift*, Heidi Axelsen & Hugo Moline Church Lane

Heidi Axelsen and Hugo Moline are artists living in Katoomba who work across architecture, installation, social process and public art. They make site-specific devices, discursive machines and social infrastructures. Their work *The Gift* is a site-specific, interactive structure that represents the concepts of shared resources and fixing things.



15. *Mushroom Matrix,* Freedom Wilson & Georgina Donovan Penny Lane

Experimental printmaker Freedom Wilson & designer/maker Georgina Donovan have transformed Penny Lane with their work titled *Mushroom Matrix*. Mushroom forms made from sustainable plywood are layered with printed images and adorn the laneways walls. The work represents the complex relationships between local species of plant and fungi.



16. *Times Spectrum,* Mark Leacy & Bianca Hayden Ha'Penny Lane

Bianca Hayden and Mark Leacy are sound and visual artists based in Blackheath. Times Spectrum is an immersive artwork featuring dichroic sculptures that spin slowly, dispersing coloured sunlight and shadowy figures down onto the ground and pedestrians, with coloured painted artwork interacting with the light play.
